

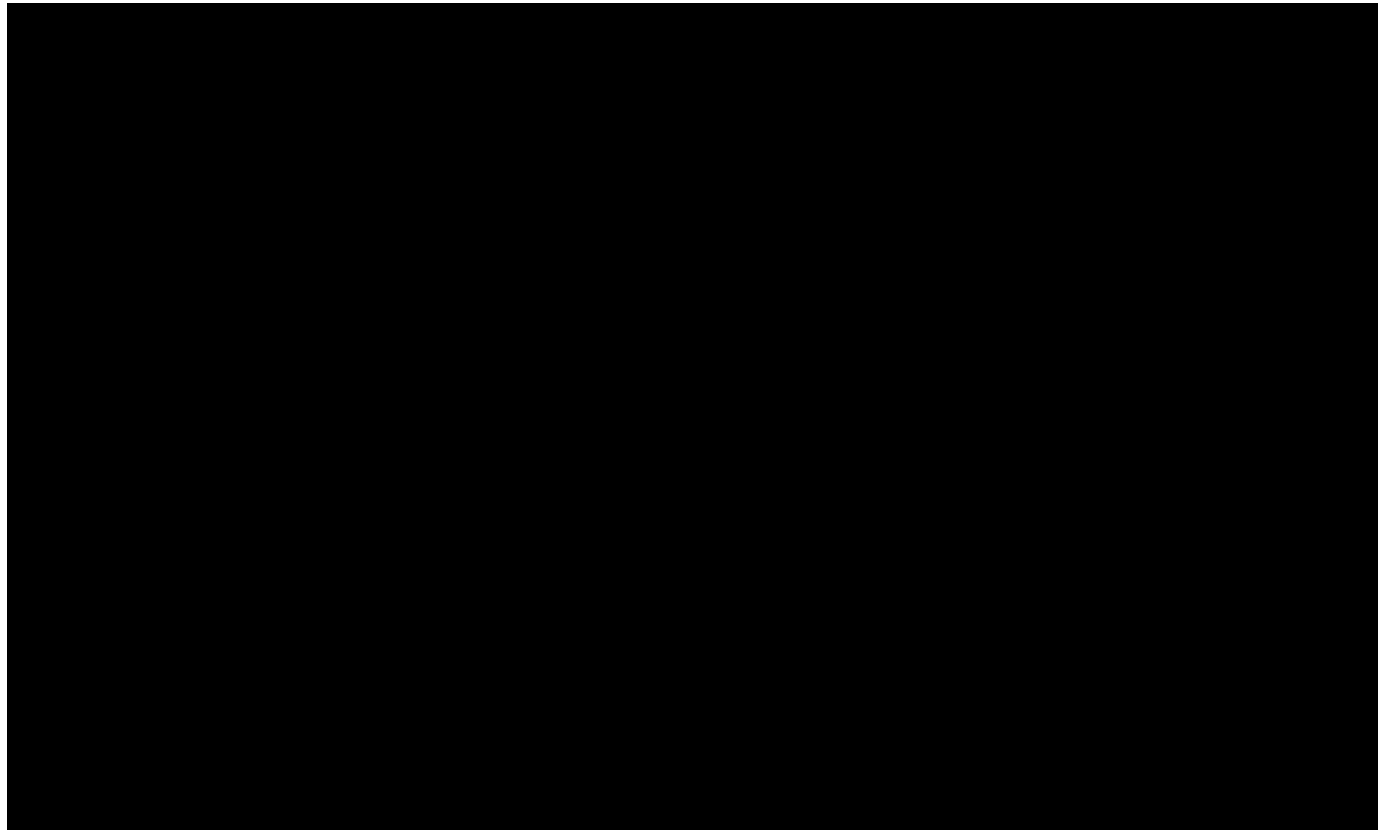

All employers in Australia have to follow workplace laws even if their workers are on a visa.

Pay

There are different minimum pay rates for different jobs that all employees have to be paid. As a guide, an employee who is 21 years or over should be getting at least \$20.33 per hour or \$25.41 if they don't get paid leave.

If an employee has to do training, attend meetings or open and close the business as part of their job, they have to be paid the right pay for all hours worked. Employees must be paid in money, not in goods and services like food, clothing or accommodation.

Holidays and taking time off work

Employees can take time off work. This is called 'leave' ('leave'). It includes:

- paid leave for holidays
- paid leave when they're sick or caring for someone
- leave when they have a baby.

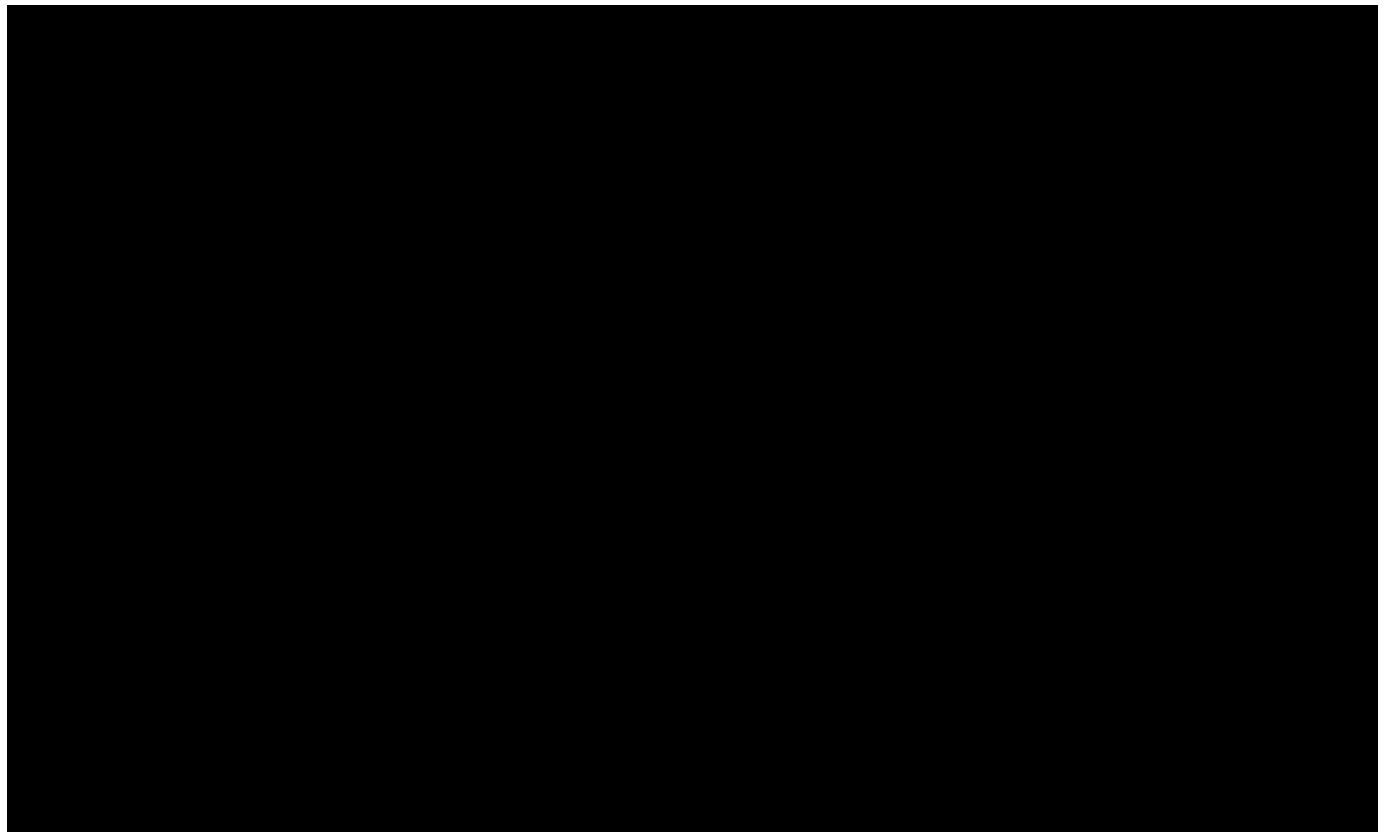
Ending employment

An employee may resign or can be dismissed (fired).

It is important that the correct notice (notice) period is given. Use our Notice and Redundancy Calculator ([Notice and Redundancy Calculator \(https://calculate.fairwork.gov.au/endingemployment\)](https://calculate.fairwork.gov.au/endingemployment)) to work out notice and redundancy (redundancy) entitlements.
